

permitting an inter-municipal liquor license transfer from outside the township to within, as your Solicitor said pursuant to Title 47 Section 461(b.3) for use at Speedway store at 500 Willow Crossing Road. As you know, since 2001 the Liquor Control Board can approve the transfer of a license from any municipality in Westmoreland County to any other municipality in the county, so long you, the receiving municipality issues a resolution, permitting that transfer. We are here tonight because of some monumental changes to the liquor code by way of Act 39 of 2016 that went into effect last August. First and perhaps foremost, the Legislature restated the purpose of the Liquor Code in Act 39, and it's worthwhile for me to read you a short segment of that restatement. "It is the purpose of this Act to reform the system by which alcohol is dispensed and controlled within this Commonwealth to reflect changes in the marketplace while continuing to protect the welfare, health, peace, and [] of citizens and to provide for the operation of the retail system that promotes competition and convenience." The first change has to do with liquid fuels prohibition. Prior to Act 39 there was a couple of sections of the liquor code that prohibited the sale of alcohol at any location, place, or property, [] sale of liquid fuels, i.e. gasoline. The PLCB interpreted that to mean, so long as you didn't pay for gas on licensed premises or store gas on licensed premises then to issue a license in that situation, and they did. They issued a number of licenses. The [] Distributors Association took exception to that interpretation and for about five years we litigated that issue in various common pleas courts and Commonwealth Court, finally went to Supreme Court and debriefed and waiting for hearing dates and low and behold the Legislature enacted Act 39 which changed the language of the Liquid Fuels Prohibition and essentially changed the language to reflect the PLCB's interpretation. So as the law stands today, the PLCB will approve the liquor license at any location, place, or property so long as gas sales do not take place on the licensed premises or gas is stored on the licensed premises. The second major change of Act 39 that impacts what we're talking about this evening has to do with the auctioning of revoked liquor licenses. Since the year 2000 the PLCB has revoked approximately 1,200 liquor licenses. Act 39 permits the PLCB to auction those licenses off and bring them off and make them active so that they generate revenues to the state. The PLCB has held three such auctions, at 50 licenses per auction, the fourth auction is currently open and closes in November. The license that we are here talking about tonight was purchased by Speedway at the last auction by the PLCB. The third change that we need to talk about tonight has to do with Act 39 and the fact that all hotel and restaurant licensees can apply for what's called Wine Expanded Permit which permits the sale of up to four bottles of wine, unopened bottles of wine, together. In order for you to make a decision on our request, let me give you a little background on Speedway. Speedway is a wholly owned subsidiary of Marathon Petroleum Corporation, headquartered in Enon, Ohio. Speedway is the second largest chain of company owned and operated convenience stores in the country with over 27,000 locations in 21 states, including 114 locations here in Pennsylvania. The majority of these stores in other states currently sell alcohol in some form depending on that state's laws. As you know, Speedway has a store here in Hempfield Township on Willow Crossing Road. Speedway is planning to remodel the store and add a seating area for seating for thirty. As part of these plans, Speedway would like to sell beer to go, and wine to go with the Wine Expanded Permit. This location will qualify for the Restaurant Liquor License because it will have seating for thirty and will have prepared food for thirty and it has more than 400 square feet, which are the minimum requirements for the restaurant liquor license. What we are requesting is really not that unusual, for the past ten years the PLCB has approved liquor licenses for over 500 grocery stores and restaurants. All beer at this location will be located in the walk-in cooler, currently called the Soda Den, it will become the Beer Den. Speedway will carry approximately one hundred different kinds of beers including all the national brands and popular craft beers in six packs and twelve packs. All beer must be paid for at the cash register in the licensed area. Although this store is open twenty-four seven, beer sales are statutorily limited, statutorily limited to 7 a.m. until the beer cooler is locked at 2 a.m. Monday through Saturday, Sunday beer sales start at 9 a.m. Wine sales must cease statutorily every day at 11 p.m. Speedway has a comprehensive responsible alcohol

management training program in place. First, all Speedway employees will receive the Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement created R.A.M.P. training, which stands for Responsible Alcohol Management Program. This teaches people how to recognize fake IDs, recognize visibly intoxicated persons, recognize pass-off situations. Second, all Speedway employees will receive Speedway's internal alcohol training. This training, the person when they're first hired gets full training, six months after that they take a refresher course, and then six months after that they take the full re-training course and full training every six months thereafter. So it's continuing on-going training program. Speedway has a 100 percent card [] policy for all customers who appear to be under the age of forty. They use a card scanner, these card scanners recognize fake IDs, recognize under-age IDs, recognize expired IDs. In addition, Speedway hires a third-party to conduct mystery shops at a minimum of six times per year for each store. So they have people come in at least six times per year trying to make purchases without an ID, sending in under age people to test their training program and that's why they train so much. In addition to the extensive employee training, Speedway has approximately thirty security cameras inside and outside the store. With the exception of the restroom, pretty much every inch of the interior of the store is covered by a security camera. This is not going to be a place where people come to hang out and drink, there's no video games, pool tables, juke boxes, those types of things that cause people to hang out and drink beer. It will be a well-lit safe and secure place where customers can purchase prepared food and a six pack of beer or a bottle of wine to take home. Speedway is a responsible owner in making a significant investment in Hempfield Township, this investment will be protected by responsible management and well-trained employees and for these reasons we ask that you pass a resolution permitting the transfer of a license into Hempfield Township. If you have any questions, I will be happy to answer them, if I can't, I'm sure one of my three people from Speedway will be able to.

Mr. Weimer – I have a question, that's kind of, my curiosity [] after hearing your presentation about Speedway operating a bona fide restaurant, so what qualifies a bona fide restaurant?

Mr. Kozar – Like I said, you have to have a minimum of 400 square feet, seating for thirty, and food for thirty.

Mr. Logan – So is, are the circle areas here seating for thirty?

Mr. Kozar – Yes, correct.

Mr. Logan – So will there be permitted to consume alcohol if they're sitting there eating?

Mr. Kozar – You will be, yeah, you will permitted to consume alcohol if you're sitting there.

Mr. Logan – Will you be permitted to take the opened bottle of alcohol out the door with you?

Mr. Kozar – No.

Mr. Logan – Who is going to?

Mr. Kozar – Well obviously well-trained employees keep an eye on

Mr. Logan – So any opened bottle has to be consumed there.

Mr. Kozar – and kind of, just as an aside, we represent a bunch of other convenience store chains who shall remain unnamed, but, my experience with them is, they see very little on premises consumption.

Mr. Logan – I was just trying to clarify for myself.

Mr. Kozar – and quite frankly, none of my convenience store clients would like to have alcohol consumed on the premises but unfortunately there is a state and Supreme Court opinion from about 2005 actually involving Sheetz that said, hey, you know what if you have beer to go you have to have at least a minimal amount for on premise consumption if people so desire.

Mr. Fagert – Is the Beer Den back in the corner there?

Mr. Kozar – Yeah. Yeah, if you've been in the store, there is kind of an angular cooler, currently called the Soda Den.

Mr. Silvis – Do you have a maximum amount that you can consume on premises? I'm sure the state has a requirement.

Mr. Kozar – Well, actually the state doesn't have a requirement of maximum you can consume on the premises but it does state that you can't serve anyone who is visibly intoxicated.

Mr. Logan – They have a maximum you can buy.

Mr. Kozar – The maximum you can buy is 192 fluid ounces, which is two six packs.

Mr. Silvis – Carry out.

Mr. Kozar – Yeah, that's for carry out.

Mr. Silvis – The reason I ask that is, I was in a convenience store the other day and a big sign, and I think you should discourage this sign, that said "32 ounces maximum amount consumed on premises." That's legally drunk as far as I'm concerned.

Mr. Kozar – It would be for me.

Mr. Silvis – That's two and a half twelve ounce bottles.

Mr. Kozar – That's two sixteen ounce beers.

Mr. Silvis – Yeah, or twelve ounce bottles, two and a half.

Mr. Weimer – Does this also mean that you're food prep, or restaurant has to be open the entire time you're allowed to sell alcohol?

Mr. Kozar – That is correct.

Mr. Weimer – Food has to be available. Any other questions? I have none. Solicitor?

Mr. Avolio – Thank you, Mr. Chairman. That was very comprehensive, I appreciate that.

Mr. Kozar – Thank you.

Mr. Avolio – We are going to open it up to anybody in the public that is appearing here to testify or provide any information to the Supervisors at this time. Please state your name and address for the record so that I can swear you in.

Dorothy Nelson – Dorothy Nelson, 239 Willow Crossing Road

Mr. Avolio – Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God?

Ms. Nelson – Yes. I live at the crossroads of Swede Hill and Willow Crossing Road, we've had numerous accidents there that are alcohol related. I just don't think we need another place open to sell alcohol. That's all I wanted to say. Any questions? I mean, a week ago Friday we had a drunk come down from the playground and do a lot of damage, property damage.

Mr. Silvis – Mr. Avolio, if we were to deny this, could they appeal it?

Mr. Avolio – They would have rights to do so. I'm not saying criteria, but.

Mr. Logan – How many other places within the Township do we have that sell?

Mr. Silvis – They all, all of them, Sheetz.

Mr. Logan – Well, I mean that you can go in and consume on site.

Mr. Silvis – I think they all do, I don't know.

Mr. Avolio – Do we have anything further for this witness?

Ms. Nelson – Thanks.

Mr. Avolio – It appears to be a close to the hearing, Mr. Chairman.
